TREASURES FROM THE COLLECTION

Everyday items from times gone by tell interesting stories about society. Take this moustache cup as an example.

Moustache cups were a thing from the 1860's, to around the First World War era. During this time, men styled their facial hair by applying wax to keep it stiff and in place. However, partaking in a cup of afternoon tea soon became a problem. As soon as the steam from a hot brew hit their moustache, the styling wax that held it together would melt and drip into the tea.

From 1860 to 1916, the British military also required soldiers to wear a moustache, as it was believed facial hair imparted an air of authority.

British potter Harvey Adams is credited with inventing the moustache cup, to solve this problem. A special teacup, with a half moon-shaped crescent insert at the top guarded a gent's facial hair. Mr. Adams was so successful with his invention that he was able to retire within 15 years.

Fashion changes, and so the trend for men of wearing a full moustache waned, consigning the moustache cup to history.
