GUILDFORD IDENTITIES

- Alfred Waylen was born at Point Walter in 1833.
- His doctorate in medicine (1858) was the first medical degree granted to a native Western Australian.
- He was Colonial Medical Officer for the Swan District, and surgeon at the Guildford convict depot.
- He was an amateur vigneron, exhibiting his wines at international exhibitions from 1866.
- He was President of the Agricultural Society and of the Horticultural Society in 1894.
- At various times, he was chairman of the Guildford Town Council, churchwarden of St. Matthews Anglican Church, founder of the Guildford Mechanics Institute, a governor of the Perth High School (now Hale School), a racehorse owner, and a committee member of the West Australian Turf Club.
- He was an advocate for public health measures, leading to reforms.
- Waylen Street in Guildford is named in his honour.
- He married twice, dying childless in 1901.
