FROM THE COLLECTION

The sad iron was a domestic tool that revolutionised the drudgery of ironing. It was so named because of the weight — five to nine pounds — needed to press wrinkled clothes and sheets. Before its invention, household irons were made of solid metal, including the handle. Thick cloths were used to pick the iron up and smooth the clothes. Even so, burns, blisters, and strained, tired arms were common.

In 1870, Mrs. Mary Florence Potts of Ottumwa, Iowa, invented the sad iron. It had a hollow metal body and an interchangeable wooden handle, so cloths to protect the hands were no longer needed. The sad iron's pointed ends also allowed ironing in either direction. Mary's invention was patented under her own name, a rarity for the time.

You can see a collection of irons through the ages, including the sad iron, when you visit the wash house display in Guildford.
