Statue for Stirling Square?

The historic town of Guildford in Western Australia was a significant military base in the First World War and recognised as the *'Home of the 10 Light Horse Regiment'* in WA.

A fund raising committee, has been formed with Charlie Zannino Chair, to investigate using 2 or 3 figures including the possibility of an indigenous stockman, soldier and horse the statue to be placed in Stirling Sq. A memorial to honour an important part of Australian History.

..."Like most I was unaware of the convicts in my family tree and my mother had no idea that her mother was the daughter of a convict. Then further research revealed that my father's mother had also been the daughter of a convict. On my maternal side, my convict ancestor married a girl, who had arrived on one of the *Bride Ships*, in the *Independent Chapel* in Swan St. Guildford on 22nd July 1862. His address shown on the

Depot and many of these men remained in the area. Marrying, working hard and building new lives for their families. Their hard work also contributed to making Guildford the place it is today.

Although the arrival of convicts made a great improvement in the availability of labour for the Swan River Colony, life for most continued to consist of hard work. And it is this hard work that made the State of Western Australia what it is today. Regardless of what walk of life our ancestors came from or how they arrived, we should all be very proud of them."
