
Congratulation's Bromwyn for another great Guildford Heritage Festival.

WHO'S BEEN SLEEPING IN MY HOUSE

George Cleverly leading jockey, featured in our article last month. George's record of two consecutive Perth Cup Winners 1893 and 1894 on *Scarpia* was equalled but not broken in 1934. It has been equalled since by back-to-back winners in 1958/1959 *Fairetha and* 1981/1982 *Magistrate*.

In 1937 George moved to Helena Street, in later years he was seen being helped on his horse (which he kept in his backyard) and riding each day up and down Helena Street.

NEW ACQUISITION

A significant donation of ephemera from Angela Sellin of Orange Ave, Upper Swan, who married a Croatian miner come vigneron (now deceased), has added considerably to the migrant story in the Swan Valley. The donor allowed the Society president and curator access to the sheds on the property to choose items for the Collection. Items selected fill gaps in the winemaking story and Angela has agreed to retain the larger items until we can accommodate them on site. One of the items with high interpretive value is a portable hand powered grape crusher
