#### **GUILDFORD HERITAGE PRECINCT VISION FOR GUILDFORD**

We have a vision that Guildford becomes a "must do" tourist attraction in a similar way to Fremantle. That people come to view Guildford as a complete historic town with a wealth of heritage buildings and plenty to do and see. The Heritage Precinct will be at the heart of the historic town and offer interpretation, access to heritage buildings and guided tours. The National Trust of Australia (WA) was established in 1959 due to the efforts of a group of concerned people who were dismayed at the disregard for the state's heritage during the 1950s. Its objectives were to raise public awareness of the importance of heritage through education and preservation. A Buildings Committee was very quickly formed and by 1961 the newly formed Trust had a short list of classified buildings.

The National Trust in 1984 classified Guildford as a National Trust Historic Town because of the survival of much of Guildford's original town plan, built fabric, and the homogenous form of the buildings. It is a contemporary example of a 19<sup>th</sup> century English country town retaining its original layout and is picturesquely located on high ground overlooking its flood plains. Guildford is a unique and comparatively intact! A 19th century urban centre within a relatively undisturbed topographical setting. The built environment reflects Guildford's most prolific period, the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries.
