Thanks to Warren Harvey visitors to the Gaol can receive a gift of a 1 cent and 2 cent coin. The coins were first introduced with decimalization on 14 February 1966. The coins were produced by the Royal Australian Mint, the Royal Mint, Melbourne, the Royal Mint, Perth, the Perth Mint and the Royal Mint, Llantrisant. The 2 cent coin was the last circulating coin for Australia struck outside the Royal Australian Mint. Both coins were withdrawn from circulation commencing in February 1992.

Did you Know?

In 1853 a justice room (courthouse) was added to the existing Gaol which was built in 1841 and extended in 1851, these sections were demolished in 1917.

The Justice room remains today and is situated in the centre of the wings built in 1867

CAPTAIN JOSEPH ERIC PIERCY M.C. & BAR, ED. By Glenis Piercy Member of SGHS & Deputy Convenor Swan River Pioneers

My late father J. Eric Piercy was born in Magill South Australia on 17th September 1890, the seventh and youngest child of Frederick and Emma (nee Silver). The family moved to Western Australia in 1894, settling at [71] James Street Guildford. Eric was educated at the Guildford Primary School and Perth Boys High School, later becoming a pattern maker and mechanical engineer with the locomotive department of the Western Australian Government Railways. He served for three years and four months in the 11th Australian Infantry Regiment prior to joining the AIF at Blackboy Hill on 2nd September 1914. Assigned to 'C' Company of the original 11th Battalion with regimental number 343, he departed for overseas as a lance corporal on HMAS *Ascanius* on 2nd November 1914.

The 11th Battalion was one of the covering force battalions of the 3rd Brigade in the Landing at Gallipoli in the early morning of 25th April 1915; he was wounded in action that day and was evacuated by hospital ship and admitted to the Tigne Hospital in Malta on 4th May. This was the first of several woundings during the course of the war.

Eric was taken on strength of the 16th Battalion on 21st February 1917 remaining with the 16th for the duration of the war. On the 31st October he was promoted to Lieutenant. During his time with the 16th he was decorated for bravery, awarded the Military Cross and Bar to the Cross. The citation for the cross said he led a forward party in a raid, had destroyed the enemy's protective wire and attacked an enemy trench. He then satisfied himself that no wounded had been left behind and used his men to cover the retirement of the raiding party.

On his return from the war he worked in various jobs including being licensee of the Vasse Hotel in Busselton. In 1938 he married Phyllis Enid Pearl Cook a young lady from Midland. In 1940 he re enlisted for army service and was promoted to Captain with the Army Intelligence as an Instructor. At the completion of his army service he worked for the Department of War Service Land Settlement until his retirement.

My father is on the Cheops Pyramid; it was a great thrill to identify him as one of the 700 odd 11th Battalion Anzacs.

It is certainly an honour that my father is one of the 32 Anzacs being recognised at the Albany Centenary on November 1st 2014.
