Yule was acting on behalf of a syndicate consisting of himself and fellow army officers Lieutenant Ninian Lowis and Lieutenant-Colonel Richmond Houghton. The land was named Houghton after the senior officer. What connection has Houghton with Guildford? Visit the Gaol and hear the stories of Moondyne Joe and Magistrate Yule. GUILDFORD VILLAGE - HERITAGE RICH - A MUSEUM WITHOUT WALLS

New interpretive panel for 117 Swan Street, (now Sutherland close) reads, "In 1917, William Bell, a Scottish migrant, acquired a carrying business, located on Swan Street, consisting of three horses and two drays. William a lover of horses, tried to resist the new fad of motorised vehicles, but in 1924 relented and purchased his first truck, though he continued to use horses until his death in 1952. During the 1920s and 30s the business was a family affair, with William out on the job, Agnes



doing the books and three of their sons, David, Robert and Alexander with their sister Mary working in the business. During this time William expanded "The Yard" through to Stirling Street. In 1937 the three brothers took over the business and renamed it Bell Bros".
