Curator report Paul Bridges

Working towards re vamping the displays in the Gaol to better interpret the building as a lock-up and former courthouse and to showcase the trades and industries of colonial Guildford and the Swan Valley. Research work has been done on collecting raw data for inclusion. A focus has been made on acquiring lists of names and information on those associated with the history of Guildford and the Swan Valley. WHO'S BEEN SLEEPING IN MY HOUSE?

By 1838, 'Garden Hill' Meadow St. had been purchased by Alfred Waylen. In 1854 Alfred Waylen offered to sell the property to the Government. The Government Resident and two other gentlemen giving a full account of the buildings and property in their report dated 22 July 1854. The inspectors found two small, mud brick cottages on the 13 acre property as well as a shingle building consisting of a kitchen, brew house and store.



The latter had a cellar of about 1.5 metres deep. Other features of the property included a small yard with stable and a deep well containing good water. Alfred Waylen Snr. died in 1856 and the property passed to his son Alfred Robert Waylen. Alfred had studied medicine in England, his medical degree was the first issued to a native born West Australian, on his return to WA in 1859 he was appointed Medical Officer at the Guildford Convict Depot. He made his home at the back of his father's house, where he established a vineyard, Padbury, Loton & Co sold his Garden Hill wine.

The Guildford Town Trust was revived in 1870 and Dr. Waylen was elected as its Chairman, Under Waylen's Town Trust, streets were cleared levelled and macadamised, drains laid with pavements of slabs. Stirling Square was cleared of tree stumps, planted with couch grass and fenced. He also appointed a Town Crier and Town Herdsman to look after the local cattle on the 90 acres of Common Land. In 1872 at the age of 39, Waylen was appointed to succeed Dr. John Ferguson as Colonial Surgeon, director of the Perth Colonial Hospital, medical officer of the Perth Prison's system, plus superintendent for the state's vaccination. In the 1890's the original buildings at Garden Hill were demolished, and in 1897 Waylen built a new large house. (pictured) overlooking the river. A few yards below, adjacent to the east and river were his original vines. Waylen resided here till he died in 1901. William Padbury purchased Garden Hill in 1902. (Garden Hill, later purchased by the Roman Catholic church and is now the site of St Charles Seminary

NEWS GUILDFORD 1866

In 1866 Moondyne Joe was on the loose, the inquirer says "Our enterprising Subinspector and his posse of police are out hunting, and it is hoped they will be successful. Simply because Mr. Piesse did not inform us publicly that he was going to follow such and such a route in his search, the surmise is that he is on the wrong scent, as nothing has been heard of him here since his departure. But I have no doubt, and a few agree with me, that he will turn up just when wanted, and do his share in capturing these pests of society. One party of police was fortunate enough to surprise the camp of Joe and his mates, and captured the watchman not, however, before his giving the alarm to the others who decamped leaving many of their 'traps' behind"...eventually recaptured he was placed in irons in solitary confinement in a specially reinforced cell with triple-barred windows at Fremantle gaol.
